Hampton Earns Regional Athletic Director Award

Brenda Hampton of Iowa Western Community College was named the 2008-2009 Junior and Community Colleges Central Region Under Armour Athletic Director of the Year during a ceremony last month. Hampton was recognized at the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics conference in Orlando, Fla.

Hampton, in her seventh year as athletic director at Iowa Western, has increased revenues in every area of the athletic department and has rejuvenated fundraising through the Reiver Booster Club. She has overseen the expansion of the Reiver sports program with the addition of men's and women's soccer, men's and women's golf, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor/outdoor track and field, and competitive cheerleading. Iowa Western will begin play in the Midwest Football Conference this fall. In 2007, Hampton helped cut the rib-

bon on the new Reiver Outdoor Track and Field Complex and moved the athletic staff into its new home with the expansion of the athletic and physical education facilities at the Kanesville Center. Reiver athletics also has seen construction of new soccer fields on campus and renovations to the softball and baseball complex. With the addition of football, there will be renovations made during the year for locker room facilities and practice fields.

During the NJCAA annual meeting in 2005, Hampton presented a bid to the NJCAA Championship Events Committee to bring the NJCAA Division I National Tournament to Council Bluffs and the Mid-America Center for 2007, 2008 and 2009. Serving as the tournament director, Hampton worked with more than 1,000 staffers and volunteers in planning and organizing the tournament. In her tenure, Hampton has seen a record-setting 50 studentathletes named NJCAA Academic All-Americans.

Hampton serves on the NJCAA Executive Committee and as the NJCAA Region XI Women's Regional Director.

New Volleyball Coach Darrin McBroom

During the last four years, Darrin McBroom has been juggling a teaching career with his part-time role as volleyball coach at Longview (Mo.) Community College. Last February, McBroom realized his dream of becoming a full-time coach when he officially became part of the Iowa Western Community College athletic department staff as IWCC's head volleyball coach. "I am excited and honored to be coming to Iowa Western," McBroom said. "I look forward to continuing the winning tradition at Iowa Western."

McBroom, a teacher in the Lee Summit School District had served as a part-time head coach at Longview since 2005 and has led the Lakers to prominence in the National Junior College Athletic Association Division II ranks. In just four years, McBroom compiled a 145-33 record and led his teams to a pair of national tournament appearances. In 2008, the Lakers finished 35-10 and were ranked as high as No. 4 in the NJCAA poll. Under his leadership, Longview has produced 15 all-region athletes and two NJCAA All-Americans, and McBroom has earned Region XVI Coach of the Year and district coach of the year honors. In 2005, McBroom was one of eight two-year college coaches nationally to be named Region Coach of the Year by the American Volleyball Coaches Association.

Prior to his stint at Longview, McBroom served as varsity coach at Oak Grove (Mo.) High School, where he compiled a 143-64-9 record from 1996-2001. He won a conference and district championship in one season at Nodaway (Mo.) High School and finished 31-4 and third in the state in 1995.

on the Executive Board of the National Alliance of Two-Year College Athletic Administrators. In November 2006 Hampton was selected to the NJ-CAA Volleyball Coaches Hall of Fame. Hampton lives in Council Bluffs and has completed the Council Bluffs Leadership Class with the Chamber of Commerce. She also serves on the Council Bluffs Sports Authority Board.

Hampton earned B.S. and B.A. degrees from Chadron State College and a master's degree from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Dramatic changes soon will be taking shape on the campus of Iowa Western Community College, and it is not just the transformation of the rolling hills to their beautiful fall colors.

Work is under way on the new student center facility, to be located on the east side of campus in Council Bluffs. The 71,000-square-foot, two-story building is expected to be completed in April 2010 and will add excitement at one of the nation's fastest-growing community colleges. The new student center will be home to a cyber library and cafe, an expanded bookstore and a spacious culinary arts lab. Total cost of the project is \$12.6 million, with another \$2.1 million funding equipment and furnishings.

he city of Harlan has a new look to the south corridor of its growing community following the grand opening of the Iowa Western Community College Shelby County Center. The new \$3.7 million facility, called College Park, is a partnership between the City of Harlan, Shelby County DevelopSource and Iowa Western.

City and state officials were on hand for a ribbon cutting and grand opening June 4 in Harlan. Dr. Dan Kinney, president of Iowa Western, praised city leaders for their commitment to the new facility. "This project would not have happened without the efforts of city and county leaders who had the foresight to enhance their community with such a beautiful facility," he said. "The opening of College Park marks an important milestone in terms of the way Iowa Western will be able to provide educational opportunities to the citizens of Shelby County."

The 24,500-square-foot facility features five classrooms, including a nursing classroom with lab, a science

"Nicole exemplifies what it means to be a great teacher," Dr. Hart said. "She is considerate of her students and the many pressures they deal with on a daily basis, and she creates classroom activities that engage her students and ties her lessons to real-life situations. She is a quality instructor and person."

Recipe for Success:

Alumn'i Utilize the Southwest Iowa Small Business Development Center and IWCC Entrepreneurial Center to Start Their Businesses.

While most of us sit back and wonder why no one has invented a product that solves a problem for us, Marie Wickman-Dykes has created the invention. She invented Mirror Gear, a dental mirror protective cover. "Through handson experience, I saw scratches ruin countless mirrors," Marie explained. "These experiences motivated me to invent the Mirror Gear."

Marie credits her education in IWCC's dental hygiene program for giving her the opportunity to advance her career and create a new product. She has been in private dental practices for eight years and realized the value in helping save money in her profession.

Moving from an idea to a patented invention is a complex process, so Marie turned for assistance to the Southwest Iowa Small Business Development Center and IWCC's Entrepreneurial Center for guidance. "The SBDC/Entrepreneurial Center provided me with all the fundamentals of starting my own business," she said. "They provided counseling and training when I needed any guidance."

The IWCC Entrepreneurial Center offers resources to small business owners, prospective entrepreneurs and, like Marie, local inventors who want to learn more about starting and operating a business. Through specialized training classes, potential business owners can learn the basics of starting their business, finding their market niche and outlining financial data that assist in securing funding.

For those already in business, the E-Center offers training in marketing, strategic planning, using financial software packages, market research, projects can be initiated by the contractor or home owner.

Cathy started this journey armed with a degree and a hobby – creating 3D renderings for friends. After starting with residential projects, she has expanded to include small commercial projects as well.

"I had a successful 20-year corporate career growing from program-

business succession and more. The SBDC counselors, available to business owners, are specially trained in many aspects of operating or funding a small business.

With her IWCC computer programming degree, Cathy Mehlin, '84 recognized an unserved niche in the home building and marketing arena. In 2006, she founded Vision by Design, which specializes in helping consumers visualize home-related changes before construction begins. Cathy creates visuals of a project's end result.

"A picture is a great communication tool between the contractor

or craftsman and the home owner," Mehlin said. "Consumers can try out different looks of materials, colors and design - printed on photo paper – rather than tearing out materials after construction is done." Vision by Design

mer, analyst, manager and IT consultant," Cathy said. "But in the back of my mind I always though that if I was not working in programming I would want to do carpentry. With my computer-based 3D rendering business, I am able to combine my skills and interests."

Like Marie, Cathy sought assistance from the SBDC/Entrepreneurial Center. "They helped me with the many areas to consider in my business startup," Cathy said. "Since my business opened, Sue Pitts and Julie Mierau have been very helpful and available to bounce ideas off of, such as in marketing approaches. I have also taken advantage of monthly entrepreneur networking discussions, which is beneficial in gaining other points of view from many areas and levels of experiences."

IWCC Nursing Center for Excellence

Within the next year, the nursing department at Iowa Western will double its capacity to educate future healthcare professionals. The new center, named the Nursing Center for Excellence, will begin major renovations and additions in Clark Hall after Jan. 1.

Along with the renovations, the nursing department will offer students 16 state-of-the-art HPS (human patient simulator) machines and other amenities to enrich their healthcare education. The simulators will provide students with real-life experiences, exposing them to the treatment of patients ranging from premature infants to geriatric adults. Improvements planned for the Clarinda Campus and Harlan Center also include HPSes.

"The Nursing Center for Excellence will be a premier facility," said Dr. Dan Kinney, IWCC president. "With this technology and our fine staff, Iowa Western will be the leading nursing education institution in the area."

The new Nursing Center of Excellence will promote crossprogrammatic learning through high-fidelity simulation for reallife application. The center will actually resemble facilities in which the trained nurses will one day work. Some features:

- 21,000 square feet of renovations;
- Debriefing rooms, technology labs, media center;
- Examination rooms;
- Fully-functioning hospital rooms;
- Surgical suites;
- EMS simulation rooms.

With these renovations and additions, students will have the opportunity to treat a 'patient' from the time she enters the ER all the way through the examination rooms, surgical suites and general hospital rooms.

"The students, faculty and staff are thrilled with the many opportunities this center will provide," said Danielle Dohrmann, director of nursing. "With this facility and the state-of-

the-art technology, our students will be exposed to routine patient cases and situations, as well as those they would not typi cally experience during clinical time."

Currently, Iowa Western has the

capacity to each year educate and graduate 96 registered nurses, 110 practical nurses, 15 surgical technologists and 13 medical assistants. By doubling its capacity, the college is helping to address the shortage of nurses facing our country. Using the baseline supply and demand projections of the U.S. De-

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partment of Labor, the shortfall of nurses for the region of Western Iowa and Eastern Nebraska is projected to increase from 8 percent to 27 percent by 2020.

"There is a true need for this facility and our expanded capacity," Kinney said. "Iowa Western is pleased to provide such a service to the communities of western Iowa and eastern Nebraska."

"I remember the man that interviewed me told me that the job was one that I would be proud to tell my grandchildren about or ashamed to tell them about," she recalled. As it turned out, the entire office staff was working on the atomic bomb project. "I had worked there for

I just graduated," Jim said. The Woodworths had their first and only child, John, in 1954, and Gertrude remained home for 17 years caring for their son. "I was very fortunate to be able to stay home," she said. "Back then they taught you in home economics that you could be a homemaker." John Woodworth now lives in Duluth, Minn., where he is partner in a successful structural design company.

Jim and Gertrude became familiar with Council Bluffs from 1956-60 while Jim was working on a new plant for lowa Power, which eventually would become Mid American Energy. Just before his retirement in 1986, Jim was working as a production engineer in Council Bluffs when his boss slid a new computer onto his desk. "They built this fancy computer for me and I never turned it on," he said. "I was afraid of the darn thing." That scary moment led to his first encounter at Iowa Western and a long relationship with the college. He earned an associate's degree in computer programming and then another degree in computer science. Gertrude decided it was time for her to find out more about her husband's new home. "He was coming out here all of the time and I wanted to see what was going on," she said. On one of her visits, Gertrude found herself knee-deep in some

r ach morning, the time on the Lowa Western campanile could be set based on the arrival of two of the college's most ardent supporters. Like clockwork, Jim and Gertrude Woodworth roll onto campus and into their office in the Iowa Western Foundation Office, where they handle a litany of projects.

"It's home," Gertrude said of their love of lowa Western. "It's provided us a younger outlook on life," Jim added.

The Woodworths would need a sizeable spreadsheet to document the number of hours they have given to the place they call home. From the Black Tie Har-

vest for Scholarships to athletics and the countless other college-sponsored activities, Jim and Gertrude always are on the scene. It is for that dedication that Iowa Western's Alumni Association named the couple the 2009 Distinguished Alumni Award winners.

Their love for IWCC, however, came long after their love for one another began with a simple date in the 1940s. Gertrude Johnson's parents ran a boarding home in Ames, Iowa, when a young Jim Woodworth knocked on the door looking for a place to live. Jim, who was studying mechanical engineering at Iowa State, admitted he was smitten

with the landlord's daughter.

"There was no kissing going on, just a friendship," Gertrude confessed. "I remember Jim did a lot of repair work around the house to help dad."

In 1942, Gertrude had just graduated from high school when Jim was called to service in the United States Air Corps, which at the time was a branch of the U.S. Army. He studied meteorology in Aviation Cadet School and was assigned to weather officer duties in the European Theatre attached to a bomber squadron. At the same time, Gertrude took a job with the United States government doing auditing work

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nearly two years before I found out," she said.

Jim returned from service in 1945 and asked Gertrude to marry him. Her parents gave their OK, but insisted they wait until Gertrude graduated from college and taught school for one year. Both graduated in 1948 - Jim with a degree in mechanical engineering and Gertrude in home economics education - and were married in 1949. "She graduated with honors, but



look beautiful for the coming semester. She became hooked on volunteerism. "One thing led to another and we had a group of volunteers," she said. "Initially there were folks like Larry Vorse, Ken Petersen and throughout the years, many, many others as well."

Jim maintained his relationship with the college as a part-time computer lab assistant, while Gertrude also jumped back into the classroom as a continuing education instructor. She also established a successful tutoring program to assist foreign students and others on campus. One of Gertrude's favorite students, Bracinda Blum of Woodbine, drove 40 miles to campus each day to get help with her reading. The mother of five had trouble reading because of dyslexia and found a special friend in the foundation office.

"I taped every text book for her so that she could learn them while driving to and from campus," Gertrude said. "She was a special girl, and she really wanted to learn."

Blum earned an associate's degree with honors from Iowa Western and went on to graduate cum laude from the University of Nebraska at Omaha with a degree in special education.

"Some folks may think we are foolish for sticking with it this long, but it is rewarding for us," Jim Woodworth said. Iowa Western, too, has reaped the rewards of the Woodworth's dedication.
